

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CAROLINA ARBORS GARDEN CLUB

Ken Kernodle, President of the North Carolina Bluebird Society, was invited to give a presentation to the Carolina Arbors Garden Club on June 20, 2017. The program was planned by Jennifer Klein, President of the Garden Club, Barbara Tyson, Program Coordinator, and Diana Craft, Secretary.

Jennifer started off the meeting by reporting that the Carolina Arbors Woodworking Club built 137 bluebird houses as a fundraiser for the Carolina Arbors Habitat for Humanity Build-a-House-for-a-Veteran project in Durham. The bluebird houses were installed in resident's yards and along the greenways throughout the development.

Ken's presentation included history of bluebirds, their past decline, present comeback, and ways we all can continue to help them flourish. He stressed the importance of nest box monitoring.

Showing NCBS *Bluebirds in the Nest Box* video was well received. Ken and I concluded with a Question & Answer session.

Carolina Arbors by Del Webb is located in Durham, NC in the Brier Creek area. Designed for active adults 55 and older, it is a beautiful community with approximately 1,000 to 1,200 residents.

Piedmont Hall is the 37,000 square foot social hub of the Arbors where residents can participate in aerobics and pottery in the daytime and dancing and parties in the evening. The community also has tennis courts and indoor and outdoor pools.

Ken and I would like to thank the Carolina Arbors Garden Club very much for their donation to the NCBS, and for inviting us to talk about our favorite subject of Bluebirds!

NEWS FROM THE NEST


I have another box which now has another 4 eggs in it. This is after two clutches were infertile! I am hoping these hatch. I learned something last week. A bluebird started building a nest in one of my boxes. It had just covered the bottom part. The next time I checked on it the nest was gone. I then checked my other box, and apparently they had changed their mind and moved to the other box and took their started nest with them. Interesting, huh? I am including a picture of the four eggs.

I am also including a shot of a brown headed cowbird that I photographed last year. They are notorious for laying their eggs in other birds nests, and letting the other parents raise them. The story goes that in the western plains they would follow herds of buffalo for food. Since the herd moved, they could not stay and raise their own young, so they would just lay their eggs in other birds nests. Clever little rascals, weren't they? I guess this one was just trying to figure out what that stuff in my bluebird feeder was!

I photographed a shot of a Black Vulture in August in Shelby. Notice the grey head! There are a number of turkey vultures here in Cleveland County. Black vultures often run in the flocks of turkey vultures.

AN UNUSUAL FRIENDSHIP

It was a beautiful spring morning when I placed a dish of mealworms out for a mother bluebird and her three juvenile offspring. All came down to the dish and began eating the worms when a female robin flew in to feed on the worms, scattering the bluebirds. The robin proceeded to load up on mealworms to feed her babies. She must have put 15 worms in her mouth at one time. I have seen this happen before. Robins have a reputation of being backyard bullies and inconsiderate to other birds.



I was shocked to see the young juvenile bluebirds fly back down to the dish and join the robin, opening their mouths begging her to feed them. The female robin fed the hungry bluebirds! I have never before seen this type of behavior. I think the young bluebirds had a lot of courage to approach a much larger and intimidating bird to begin with. Never did I think this act of concern would come from a robin. Maybe robins aren't the bullies as many think. Maybe different bird species can get along.

Those babies were from the second brood. I was anxious to see how the robin would react to the third brood babies. I was not disappointed. The third brood had fledged and were up in a tree being fed by mom and dad. Mom and Dad flew off and who do you suppose showed up? A Momma robin! The parents had to have seen her there but didn't interfere. Today I saw the second and third broods down on the dish eating and the female robin joined them as if she was one of them. I hope she comes back next year!

BLUEBIRDERS OF WAKE COUNTY

Bluebirders of Wake County club holds free quarterly meetings open to the public. In addition to a strong focus on bluebirds, discussion includes various other birds, nature and wildlife. Guest speakers with expertise in specialized topics are often part of the program. Time is usually allocated each meeting to ask questions and share stories.

Founder Bill Satterwhite's dedication to bluebird conservation is unparalleled. He is known as the "Bluebird Man of Wake County" for all his efforts in this area. He builds bluebird nest boxes, recruits people to help monitor bluebird trails, and gives presentations to educate about bluebirds

The Bluebirder of Wake meetings typically include Mr. Bill's nest box presentation. He spends time showing and discussing several nest boxes, pointing out their pros and cons. Bill demonstrates how to mount nest boxes on poles and offers low-cost suggestions for nest cups, such as using empty blueberry or strawberry containers. Bill has given away several of his autographed nest boxes in contests at recent Bluebirder meetings.

Bill's love for bluebirds began in childhood. As the years ticked by he stopped seeing these sweet birds. His involvement in their conservation effort began about 25 years ago. At that time the bluebird population was on the decline, with one factor being loss of their natural nesting sites.

Bill, like others concerned with bluebird's welfare, was helping overcome this obstacle by supplying man-made nest boxes favorable for bluebirds to lay their eggs with less threat from predators.

Bill shared an amusing story about working on installing his first nest box. Before he was finished, a bluebird pair was sitting on the nest box. This cute incident sealed the deal. Bill knew it was his calling to continue to help these precious creatures.

NEST BOXES ARE KEY TO BLUEBIRD SURVIVAL


Bluebirds have made a strong comeback in the last few decades with help from so many concerned citizens and groups, but this sweet bird will likely always need man's assistance. Nest boxes have been crucial in helping bluebirds overcome challenges and continue to be critical to their future.

A concern Bill Satterwhite warned about is that people will become complacent and think bluebirds no longer need assistance. That could not be further from the truth. With the loss of so many natural nesting places, bluebirds now greatly depend on humans. Providing nest boxes is still of the utmost importance!

Bill strives to ensure people are educated about bluebird's need for nest boxes and supplied with information. There is a wealth of nestbox information available on www.ncbluebird.org and www.bluebirdersofwake.org about installing, maintaining, and monitoring of the nest boxes.
